In the Sunday School that I lead we've been looking at parables this term. It's been really fun to be honest, I work with the years 5 & 6 (9-11-year-olds in old money) and as ever, I have been amazed at the insights that they are able to find in such familiar text. We work simply, just opening a Bible each, reading the story and working through some simple questions. Questions such as "what's your favourite part of this story", which is more than enough to get a discussion going, and off we go!



This week's discussion included the questions "Why would a good parent say yes to a ridiculous request such as 'Could I have my inheritance before you die?'", "Have you ever felt like your sibling didn't get the telling off they deserved?", and a really interesting thought, whether eating pig food would have been enough to make you swallow your pride and go back to the family farm. There were some bold claims made by one of the children who said they would be sticking it out much longer! To be honest I'm still thinking about some of the conversation. My understanding of the story has been deepened for having talked about it with some people who see the world differently to me, who in fact have brains that are wired differently to mine.

At times like this I am reminded of something that Jerome Berryman said. When asked what a church would be like without children he said: "It would be difficult for the adults to worship as there would be no one to show them how to enter the Kingdom of God". I've experienced this many times throughout the twenty years I've been working with children in faith settings, and my faith has been enriched by their insights and example.

I say this to encourage you to take this seriously. We are currently short of volunteers to work with children in our churches and I think part of the issue is that we've forgotten how much fun it can be and how we can encounter Jesus in those spaces just as much as in the 'adult' bit of the service. If you can I'd love for you to think about working with children in your church, not because you 'ought to' but because you might find that you love it. If you're a vicar looking for volunteers, please let them know that they are going to have a great time.

Obviously, a room full of children might be a bit daunting to start with, any new things often are but we would love to help. We can help manage the behaviour of the children well so that they listen well and contribute in an organised fashion. You'll need to tell the story well and then ask some good questions that open up conversation rather check they were listening, but we can help with that too!

All of this is on Mighty Leaders: our new free online learning community for anyone volunteering or working with children and young people. Users will be able to increase their skills and confidence working with children and young people by:

- Posting questions to experienced families, youth and children's workers.
- Attending online or in-person events.

- Sharing your experiences and learning from others.
- Accessing content written to inspire and educate.

New Bishop of Edmonton

The Revd Canon Dr Anderson Jeremiah has been announced as the next Bishop of Edmonton. Currently Anderson is Associate Dean (Equality, Diversity, Inclusion and People) in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Lancaster University, and Associate Priest at St Paul's Scotforth, in the Diocese of Blackburn. He is Canon Theologian of Blackburn Cathedral and has been a member of the Committee for Minority Ethnic Concerns, the Archbishops' Anti-Racism Task Force, General Synod, the Faith and Order Commission and the Ministry Council. He has also been widely published for wide-ranging

academic and theological research. He will draw on this experience as the holder of the racial justice portfolio in the College of Bishops. **Anderson will be consecrated in the spring – details TBC.**



The Revd Paul Conrad

Fr Paul was trained for ministry at St Stephen's House, Oxford, and he was ordained in 1980. He served his title in the Diocese of Chelmsford and went on to serve another curacy at St Mary Somers Town. Since then he has been the Vicar of St Martin Gospel Oak and Chaplain at the Royal Free Hospital before joining Christ Church Hampstead in 1995. Fr Paul will retire at the end of May. His final Sunday will be 19 May 2024.

Race Equality Week

What is Race Equality Week?

Race Equality Week is an annual UK-wide movement uniting hundreds of thousands of organisations and individuals to address the barriers to race equality in the workplace.

Purpose and Aims

Race Equality Week 2024 aims to keep the momentum going and accelerate change by uniting thousands of organisations into action to seriously address race inequality in the workplace.



Why the 2024 Theme #ListenActChange?

The theme, #ListenActChange, was selected by the Race Equality Matters community. It reflects ongoing findings and feedback. In particular:

- Only 25 % of the REM community believes their organisation focuses on action, change, and impact, and not just words.
- 63% believe that less than a quarter of allies are actually helping to tackle race inequality.
- 44% said their senior leaders and managers are committed to tackling race inequality, but only 21% said their senior leaders and managers are making an impact in tackling race inequality.

We need to make it everyone's business!

Building on the REW 2023 theme, which sent a clear message that race equality is everyone's business (#ItsEveryonesBusiness), in 2024 #ListenActChange will galvanise everyone to focus on taking action. There has been a lot of listening, and discussing, but very little action and even less meaningful change. If we all commit to #ListenActChange, then real change can take place. Everyone has a role to play in the fight for racial equality in the workplace, from the top of each organisation to the bottom. The sooner we act, the sooner change can become our reality! That is why the 2024 Race Equality Week theme is #ListenActChange.

How can my organisation get involved?

Organisations can get involved in Race Equality Week 'For Free'. You can create your own activities and/or access and implement the solutions, tools, and resources we have co-created with those with lived experience. This year, we are introducing two new solutions for organisations to access for Free. The 5-Day Challenge 2024 and #ItsNotMicro. REM also provides digital assets that your organisation can use to show that you are taking part in this year's Race Equality Week.

Thinking Differently About Church: Understanding Autism and Neurodiversity

7-8.30pm on 15 February 2024 by Zoom for Clergy and LLMs

Neurodiversity is the idea that there are natural variations in how people think, communicate, sense, and understand the world. These differences include autism, ADHD, dyslexia, dyspraxia, Tourette's and more. As we seek to be church for all people, understanding Neurodiversity is important to enable the gifts,



talents, and full potential of all people to be included and released within our mission and ministry.

The training consists of a 90-minute introduction to Neurodiversity, dispelling many of the common myths and misunderstandings. It will offer a modern understanding of autism and neurodiversity and practical strategies for effective communication and collaboration. Attendees will also gain insight into how simple adaptations to buildings and to team approaches can yield excellent outcomes for all. Each event will have a maximum of 30 participants. Sessions will be led by neurodivergent training specialists with a range of insight and experience of church, working in partnership with St Martin in the Fields. 


CMD Clergy Law – Facilitating Faculties
